# Holy Spirit of the "Fundamental Principles"

### Introduction to the 1889 Fundamental Principles

As elsewhere stated, Seventh-day Adventists have no creed but the Bible; but they hold to certain well-defined points of faith, for which they feel prepared to give a reason "to every man that asketh" them. The following propositions may be taken as a summary of the principal features of their religious faith, upon which there is, so far as we know, entire unanimity throughout the body. They believe,— <u>FP1889 147.1</u>

**I.** That there is one God, a personal, spiritual being, the creator of all things, omnipotent, omniscient, and eternal; infinite in wisdom, holiness, justice, goodness, truth, and mercy; unchangeable, and <u>everywhere present by his representative, the Holy Spirit. Psalm 139:7</u>. <u>FP1889 147.2</u>

**XVII.** That as the natural or carnal heart is at enmity with God and his law, this enmity can be subdued only by a radical transformation of the affections, <u>the exchange of unholy for holy principles</u>; that this transformation follows repentance and faith, <u>is the special work of the Holy Spirit</u>, and constitutes regeneration, or conversion. <u>FP1889 150.5</u>

**XIX.** That the Spirit of God was promised to manifest itself in the church through certain gifts, enumerated especially in <u>1 Corinthians 12</u> and <u>Ephesians 4</u>; that these gifts are not designed to supersede, or take the place of, the Bible, which is sufficient to make us wise unto salvation, any more than the Bible can take the place of the Holy Spirit; that, in specifying the various channels of its operation, that Spirit has simply made provision for its own existence and presence with the people of God to the end of time, to lead to an understanding of that word which it had inspired, to convince of sin, and to work a transformation in the heart and life; and that those who deny to the Spirit its place and operation, do plainly deny that part of the Bible which assigns to it this work and position. <u>FP1889 150.7</u>

# What is Grace?

### **Unmerited Favor/Mercy**

... We shall then be able to tell the lost concerning the plan of salvation,—that while the world was lying under the curse of sin, <u>the Lord presented terms of mercy to the fallen and hopeless sinner</u>, <u>and revealed the value and meaning of his grace</u>. <u>Grace is unmerited favor</u>... our sinfulness calls for the exercise of grace from a merciful God. It was grace that sent our Saviour to seek us as wanderers and bring us back to the fold. <u>ST</u> <u>December 19, 1892, par. 2</u>

The Scripture answers, "We are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus unto good works, which God hath before ordained that we should walk in them." In his divine arrangement, <u>through his unmerited favor, the Lord has ordained that good works shall be rewarded.</u> We are accepted through <u>Christ's merit alone</u>; and the acts of mercy, the deeds of charity, which we perform, are the fruits of faith; and they become a blessing to us; for men are to be rewarded according to their works. It is the fragrance of the merit of Christ that makes our good works acceptable to God, and it is grace that enables us to do the works for which he rewards us. Our works in and of themselves have no merit. When we have done all that it is possible for us to do, we are to count ourselves as unprofitable servants. We deserve no thanks from God. We have only done what it was our duty to do, and our works could not have been performed in the strength of our own sinful natures. <u>RH January 29, 1895, par. 4</u>

It is only through the unmerited grace of Christ that any man can find entrance into the city of God. COL 394.3

<u>Hebrews</u> <u>4:16</u> Let us therefore come boldly unto the throne of <u>grace</u>, <u>that we may obtain mercy</u>, and find grace to help in time of need.

### Transforming Agency, Power, Strength, Redemptive

The Holy Spirit comes to the soul as a Comforter. By the <u>transforming agency</u> of His grace, the image of God is reproduced in the disciple; he becomes a new creature. Love takes the place of hatred, and the heart receives the divine similitude. This is what it means to live "by every word that proceedeth out of the mouth of God." This is eating the Bread that comes down from heaven. <u>DA 391.1</u>

... Each(John & Judas) possessed serious defects of character; and each had access to the <u>divine grace</u> <u>that transforms character</u>. But while one in humility was learning of Jesus, the other revealed that he was not a doer of the word, but a hearer only. One, daily dying to self and overcoming sin, was sanctified through the truth; the other, resisting the <u>transforming power of grace</u> and indulging selfish desires, was brought into bondage to Satan. <u>AA 558.1</u>

Such transformation of character as is seen in the life of John is ever the result of communion with Christ. There may be marked defects in the character of an individual, yet when he becomes a true disciple of Christ, the power of <u>divine grace transforms and sanctifies</u> him. Beholding as in a glass the glory of the Lord, he is changed from glory to glory, until he is like Him whom he adores. <u>AA 559.1</u>

When through repentance and faith we accept Christ as our Saviour, the Lord pardons our sins, and remits the penalty prescribed for the transgression of the law. The sinner then stands before God as a just person; he is taken into favor with Heaven, and through the Spirit has fellowship with the Father and the Son. Then there is yet another work to be accomplished, and this is of a progressive nature. The soul is to be sanctified through the truth. And this also is accomplished through faith. For it is only by the grace of Christ, which we receive through faith, that the character can be transformed. ST November 3, 1890, par. 1

No deep-seated love for Jesus can dwell in the heart that does not realize its own sinfulness. <u>The soul that is</u> <u>transformed by the grace of Christ</u> will admire His divine character; but if we do not see our own moral deformity, it is unmistakable evidence that we have not had a view of the beauty and excellence of Christ. <u>SC</u> <u>65.1</u>

<u>2 Corinthians</u> <u>12:9</u> And he said unto me, <u>My grace</u> is sufficient for thee: for <u>my strength</u> is made perfect in weakness. Most gladly therefore will I rather glory in my infirmities, that the power of Christ may rest upon me. <u>Romans</u> <u>3:24</u> Being justified freely by his <u>grace through the redemption</u> that is in Christ Jesus:

<u>2 Thessalonians</u> <u>2</u>:<u>16</u> Now our Lord Jesus Christ himself, and God, even our Father, which hath loved us, and hath given *us* <u>everlasting consolation</u> and <u>good hope</u> through grace,

### The Spirit of Christ

Some seem to feel that they must be on probation, and must prove to the Lord that they are reformed, before they can claim His blessing. But they may claim the blessing of God even now. <u>They must have His grace, the Spirit of Christ</u>, to help their infirmities, or they cannot resist evil. Jesus loves to have us come to Him just as we are, sinful, helpless, dependent. We may come with all our weakness, our folly, our sinfulness, and fall at His feet in penitence. It is His glory to encircle us in the arms of His love and to bind up our wounds, to cleanse us from all impurity. <u>SC 52.2</u>

Only to those who wait humbly upon God, who watch for His guidance and grace, is the <u>Spirit</u> given. The power of God awaits their demand and reception. <u>This promised blessing</u>, <u>claimed by faith</u>, <u>brings all other</u> <u>blessings in its train</u>. It is given according to the riches of the grace of Christ, and He is ready to supply every soul according to the capacity to receive. <u>DA 672.1</u>
